

Admission Policy of Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí

1. Introduction

This Admission Policy complies with the requirements of the Education Act 1998, the Education (Admission to Schools) Act 2018 and the Equal Status Act 2000. In drafting this policy, the Board of Management of the school has consulted with school staff, the school patron and with parents of children attending the school.

The policy was approved by the school patron and ratified by the Board on 16th of September 2025.

It is published on the school's website and will be made available in hard copy to any person who requests it.

The relevant dates and timelines for Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí's admission process are set out in the school's Admission Notice which is published annually on the school's website at least one week before the commencement of the admission process for the school year concerned.

This policy must be read in conjunction with the Annual Admission Notice for the school year concerned.

The application form for admission is published on the school's website and will be made available in hard copy to any person who requests it.

2. Characteristic spirit and general objectives of the school

Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí is a Catholic all-boys primary school with a Catholic ethos under the patronage of the Bishop of **Cork and Ross**.

"Catholic Ethos" in the context of a Catholic primary school means the ethos and characteristic spirit of the Roman Catholic Church, which aims to promote:

- (a) The full and harmonious development of all aspects of the person of the pupil, including the intellectual, physical, cultural, moral and spiritual aspects; and
- (b) A living relationship with God and with other people; and
- (c) A philosophy of life inspired by belief in God and in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus; and
- (d) The formation of pupils in the Catholic faith, where the school provides religious education for pupils in accordance with the doctrines, practices and traditions of the Roman

Catholic Church, and/or such ethos and/or characteristic spirit as may be determined or interpreted from time to time by the Irish Episcopal Conference.

In accordance with Section 15 (2) (b) of the Education Act 1998, the Board of Management of Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí shall uphold, and be accountable to the patron for so upholding, the characteristic spirit of the school as determined by the cultural, educational, moral, religious, social, linguistic and spiritual values and traditions which inform and are characteristic of the objectives and conduct of the school.

Mission statement and general objectives of the school

Our mission is to cherish and challenge children in a warm, safe and stimulating learning environment. We aim to provide a broad and balanced curriculum and create a centre of excellence in which high professional standards are maintained. The school's mission is advanced through our strong partnership with parents and the local community. Once just a little fishing village, the parish of Blackrock today is renowned for its attractive amenities and strong sporting traditions as well as its historical landmarks. In Scoil Barra Buachaillí we are very aware of our legacy and the privileges afforded to our pupils and strive at all times to maintain strong links with the wider school community.

3. Admission Statement

Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí will not discriminate in its admission of a pupil to the school on any of the following:

- (a) The gender ground of the student or the applicant in respect of the student concerned.
- (b) The civil status ground of the student or the applicant in respect of the student concerned.
- (c) The family status ground of the student or the applicant in respect of the student concerned.
- (d) The sexual orientation ground of the student or the applicant in respect of the student concerned.
- (e) The religion ground of the student or the applicant in respect of the student concerned
- (f) The disability ground of the student or the applicant in respect of the student concerned
- (g) The ground of race of the student or the applicant in respect of the student concerned
- (h) The Traveller community ground of the student or the applicant in respect of the student concerned.
- (i) The ground that the student or the applicant in respect of the student concerned has special educational needs.

As per Section 61 (3) of the Education Act 1998, 'civil status ground', 'disability ground', 'discriminate', 'family status ground', 'gender ground', 'ground of race', 'religion ground',

‘sexual orientation ground’ and ‘Traveller community ground’ shall be construed in accordance with Section 3 of the Equal Status Act 2000.

Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí is an all-boys school and does not discriminate where it refuses to admit a girl applying for admission to this school.

Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí is a school whose objective is to provide education in an environment which promotes certain religious values and does not discriminate in relation to the admission of a student who has applied for a place in the school in accordance with Section 7A of the Equal Status Act 2000.

Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí is a school whose objective is to provide education in an environment which promotes certain religious values and does not discriminate where it refuses to admit as a student a person who is not Catholic and it is proved that the refusal is essential to maintain the ethos of the school.

Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí is a school which has established classes, with the approval of the Minister for Education and Skills, that provide an education exclusively for students with a category or categories of special educational needs specified by the Minister and may refuse to admit to the class a student who does not have the category of needs specified.

Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí will cooperate with the National Council for Special Education in the performance by the Council of its functions under the Education for Persons with Special Educational Needs Act 2004 relating to the provision of education to children with special educational needs, including in particular by the provision and operation of a special class or classes when requested to do so by the Council.

Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí will comply with any direction served on the patron or the board, as the case may be, under section 37A and any direction served on the board under section 67(4B) of the Education Act

4. Categories of Special Educational Needs catered for in the school/special class

Children and young people are eligible for enrolment in a special class for autism when the following is provided in support of such an application:

Professional report(s) outlining:

Diagnosis of special educational needs Autism: DSM IV/V or ICD 10/11

(psychologist, psychiatrist, multi-disciplinary report)

AND

A demonstration of the understanding of complexity of the child's overall level of need/s evidenced in the professional reports

AND

Given the severity or complexity of the child's support needs, a clear professional recommendation as to what educational placement type would be most appropriate to best meet the child's needs, along with the rationale for same

AND

A letter from the NCSE confirming that the child is known to them and that the child has the required diagnosis and recommendation for a special class for autism.

Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí with the approval of the Minister for Education and Skills, has established two classes to provide an education exclusively for students with Autism.

5. Admission of Students

This school shall admit each student seeking admission except where:

- a) The school is oversubscribed (please see Section 6 below for further details).
- b) A parent of a student, when required by the principal in accordance with Section 23(4) of the Education (Welfare) Act 2000, fails to confirm in writing that the Code of Behaviour of the school is acceptable to him or her and that he or she shall make all reasonable efforts to ensure compliance with such code by the student.

Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí provides education exclusively for boys and may refuse to admit as a student a person who is not of the gender provided for by this school.

Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí is a Catholic school and may refuse to admit as a student a person who is not of Catholic denomination where it is proved that the refusal is essential to maintain the ethos of the school.

The special classes attached to Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí provide an education exclusively for students with Autism and the school may refuse admission to this class, where the student concerned does not have the specified category of special educational needs provided for in this class.

6. Oversubscription

In the event that the school is oversubscribed, the school will, when deciding on applications for admission, apply the following selection criteria in the order listed below to those applications that are received within the timeline for receipt of applications as set out in the school's Annual Admission Notice:

1. a) Pupils already enrolled in Beaumont Boys School, or Beaumont Girls School.*
b) Brothers of pupils already enrolled in Beaumont Boys School or Beaumont Girls School (including step-brothers resident at the same address).
2. Boys living within the Parish.**
3. Sons of staff members of Beaumont Boys School or Beaumont Girls School.
4. Sons of past pupils of Beaumont Boys School or Beaumont Girls School.
5. All other applicants.

**This applies to applications for a place in the special class.*

***Parish – pupils who live within the parish boundaries which is the catchment area for the school regardless of whether children are Catholic or not.*

In the event that two or more students are tied for a place or places in any of the selection criteria categories above, i.e., where the number of applicants exceeds the number of remaining places, the following arrangements will apply:

1. a) Applicants already enrolled in Beaumont Boys School, in the first instance, or Beaumont Girls School will be determined in order of age with priority given to the eldest
b) Applicants who are brothers of pupils already enrolled in Beaumont Boys School, in the first instance, or Beaumont Girls School will be determined in order of age with priority given to the eldest

2. Applicants living in the parish will be determined in order of age with priority given to the eldest
3. Applicants who are sons of staff members of Beaumont Boys School , in the first instance, or Beaumont Girls School will be determined in order of age with priority given to the eldest
4. Applicants who are sons of past pupils of Beaumont Boys School, in the first instance, or Beaumont Girls School will be determined in order of age with priority given to the eldest
5. Applicants who are not resident in the parish, will be determined priority in order of proximity to the school, priority given to the closest to the school as measured by a straight line on an Ordnance Survey map.

Applications received within the timeframe outlined within the Annual Admission Notice will be given priority over late applicants.

7. What will not be considered or taken into account

In accordance with Section 62(7) (e) of the Education Act, the school will not consider or take into account any of the following in deciding on applications for admission or when placing a student on a waiting list for admission to the school:

- (a) a student's prior attendance at a preschool or pre-school service, including Naíonraí;
- (b) the payment of fees or contributions (howsoever described) to the school;
- (c) a student's academic ability, skills or aptitude; other than in relation to a special class insofar as it is necessary in order to ascertain whether or not the student has the category of special educational needs concerned;
- (d) the occupation, financial status, academic ability, skills or aptitude of a student's parents;
- (e) a requirement that a student, or his parents, attend an interview, open day or other meeting as a condition of admission;
- (f) a student's connection to the school by virtue of a member of his or her family attending or having previously attended the school other than as outlined in the selection criteria (1) siblings of a student attending the school and/or (2) parents of a student having attended the school.

In relation to two parents having attended, a school may only apply this criteria to a maximum of 25% of the available spaces as set out in the school's Annual Admission Notice.

- (g) The date and time on which an application for admission was received by the school.

This is subject to the application being received at any time during the period specified for receiving applications set out in the Annual Admission Notice of the school for the school year concerned.

8. Decisions on applications

All decisions on applications for admission to Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí will be based on the following:

- Our school's Admission Policy.
- The school's Annual Admission Notice (where applicable).
- The information provided by the applicant in the school's official application form received during the period specified in our Annual Admission Notice for receiving applications.

(Please see Section 14 below in relation to applications received outside of the admissions period and Section 15 below in relation to applications for places in years other than the intake group.)

Selection criteria that are not included in our school Admission Policy will not be used to make a decision on an application for a place in our school.

9. Notifying applicants of decisions

Applicants will be informed in writing as to the school's decision within the timeline outlined in the Annual Admission Notice.

If a student is not offered a place in our school, the reasons why they were not offered a place will be communicated in writing to the applicant, including, where applicable, details of the student's ranking against the selection criteria and details of the student's place on the waiting list for the school year concerned.

Applicants will be informed of the right to seek a review/right of appeal of the school's decision (see Section 18 below for further details).

10. Acceptance of an offer of a place by an applicant

In accepting an offer of admission from Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí, you must indicate:

- (i) Whether or not you have accepted an offer of admission for another school or schools. If you have accepted such an offer, you must also provide details of the offer or offers concerned;

and

- (ii) Whether or not you have applied for and are awaiting confirmation of an offer of admission from another school or schools, and if so, you must provide details of the other school or schools concerned.

11. Circumstances in which offers may not be made or may be withdrawn

An offer of admission may not be made or may be withdrawn by Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí where:

- (i) It is established that information contained in the application is false or misleading.

- (ii) An applicant fails to confirm acceptance of an offer of admission on or before the date set out in the Annual Admission Notice of the school.
 - (iii) The parent of a student, when required by the principal in accordance with Section 23(4) of the Education (Welfare) Act 2000, fails to confirm in writing that the Code of Behaviour of the school is acceptable to him or her and that he or she shall make all reasonable efforts to ensure compliance with such code by the student;
- or
- (iv) An applicant has failed to comply with the requirements of ‘Acceptance of an Offer’ as set out in Section 10 above.

12. Sharing of data with other schools

Applicants should be aware that Section 66(6) of the Education (Admission to Schools) Act 2018 allows for the sharing of certain information between schools in order to facilitate the efficient admission of students.

Section 66(6) allows a school to provide a patron or another Board of Management with a list of the students in relation to whom:

- (i) An application for admission to the school has been received,
- (ii) An offer of admission to the school has been made,

or

- (iii) An offer of admission to the school has been accepted.

The list may include any or all of the following:

- (i) The date on which an application for admission was received by the school;
- (ii) The date on which an offer of admission was made by the school;
- (iii) The date on which an offer of admission was accepted by an applicant;
- (iv) A student’s personal details including his name, address, date of birth and Personal Public Service (PPS) number (within the meaning of Section 262 of the Social Welfare Consolidation Act 2005).

13. Waiting list in the event of oversubscription

In the event of there being more applications to the school year concerned than places available, a waiting list of students, whose applications for admission to Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí were unsuccessful due to the school being oversubscribed, will be compiled and will remain valid for the school year in which admission is being sought.

Placement on the waiting list of Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí is in the order of priority assigned to the students' applications after the school has applied the selection criteria in accordance with this Admission Policy.

Applicants whose applications are received after the closing date, outlined in the Annual Admission Notice, will be placed at the end of the waiting list in order of the date of receipt of the application.

Offers of any subsequent places that become available for and during the school year in relation to which admission is being sought will be made to those students on the waiting list, in accordance with the order of priority in relation to which the students have been placed on the list.

14. Late Applications

All applications for admission received after the closing date as outlined in the Annual Admission Notice will be considered and decided upon in accordance with our school's Admissions Policy, the Education Admissions to School Act 2018, and any regulations made under that Act.

Late applicants will be notified of the decision in respect of their application no later than three weeks after the date on which the school received the application. Late applicants will be offered a place if there is a place available. In the event that there is no place available, the name of the applicant will be added to the waiting list as set out in Section 13.

15. Procedures for admission of students to other years and during the school year

The procedures of the school in relation to the admission of students who are not already admitted to the school to classes or years other than the school's intake group are as follows:

- Selection criteria as laid out in Section 6 above apply for admission to all classes.
- A maximum of 30 pupils per class will be accommodated.
- Only pupils who have reached their 4th birthday at the start of the academic year will be considered for placement in junior infants' mid-academic year, pupils who have reached their 5th birthday at the start of the academic year will be considered for placement in senior infants etc.
- In determining admission, the Board of Management shall take into account the Department of Education and Skills regulations and recommendations regarding staffing provisions, maximum class size and maximum class average and any other relevant requirements concerning accommodation such as physical space, the educational needs and rights of children already enrolled, multi-grade classes and the presence of children with special educational/behavioural needs.

This requires balanced judgement which is guided by the principles of natural justice and acting in the best interest of all children. The Board of Management shall at all times have regard for the health, safety and welfare of pupils and staff in the school.

The procedures of the school in relation to the admission of students who are not already admitted to the school, after the commencement of the school year in which admission is sought, are as follows:

- Pupils newly resident in the catchment area may apply for admission mid-year. Places will be allocated, where available, as per the selection criteria as outlined in Section 6.

If the class/school is oversubscribed the application will be waitlisted for a place within the academic year. Applications for subsequent years will follow guidance in the Annual Admission Notice.

Only pupils who have reached their 4th birthday at the start of the academic year will be considered for placement in junior infants' mid-academic year, pupils who have reached their 5th birthday at the start of the academic year will be considered for placement in senior infants etc.

Should all pupils already on a waitlist have been accommodated, further applications will be dealt with on a first come first served basis.

16. Declaration in relation to the non-charging of fees

This rule applies to all schools.

The board of Scoil Barra Naofa Buachaillí or any persons acting on its behalf will not charge fees for or seek payment or contributions (howsoever described) as a condition of:

- (a) An application for admission of a student to the school

Or

- (b) The admission or continued enrolment of a student in the school.

17. Arrangements regarding students not attending religious instruction

This section must be completed by schools that provide religious instruction to students.

The following are the school's arrangements for students, where the parent(s) have requested that the student attends the school without attending religious instruction in the school. These arrangements will not result in a reduction in the school day of such students:

- A written request should be made to the Principal.
- A meeting will then be arranged with the parent(s), as the case may be, to discuss how the request may be accommodated by the school.

18. Reviews/appeals

Review of decisions by the Board of Management

The parent of the student may request the Board to review a decision to refuse admission. Such requests must be made in accordance with Section 29C of the Education Act 1998.

The timeline within which such a review must be requested and the other requirements applicable to such reviews are set out in the procedures determined by the Minister under Section 29B of the Education Act 1998 which are published on the website of the Department of Education and Skills.

The Board will conduct such reviews in accordance with the requirements of the procedures determined under Section 29B and with Section 29C of the Education Act 1998.

Note: Where an applicant has been refused admission due to the school being oversubscribed, the applicant **must request a review** of that decision by the Board of Management prior to making an appeal under Section 29 of the Education Act 1998.

Where an applicant has been refused admission due to a reason other than the school being oversubscribed, the applicant **may request a review** of that decision by the Board of Management prior to making an appeal under Section 29 of the Education Act 1998.

Right of appeal

Under Section 29 of the Education Act 1998, the parent(s) of the applicant may appeal a decision of this school to refuse admission.

An appeal may be made under Section 29 (1) (c) (i) of the Education Act 1998 where the refusal to admit was due to the school being oversubscribed.

An appeal may be made under Section 29 (1) (c) (ii) of the Education Act 1998 where the refusal to admit was due a reason other than the school being oversubscribed.

Where an applicant has been refused admission due to the school being oversubscribed, the applicant **must request a review** of that decision by the Board of Management **prior to making an appeal** under Section 29 of the Education Act 1998. (See Review of decisions by the Board of Management.)

Where an applicant has been refused admission due to a reason other than the school being oversubscribed, the applicant **may request a review** of that decision by the Board of

Management prior to making an appeal under Section 29 of the Education Act 1998. (See Review of decisions by the Board of Management.)

Appeals under Section 29 of the Education Act 1998 will be considered and determined by an independent appeals committee appointed by the Minister for Education and Skills.

The timeline within which such an appeal must be made and the other requirements applicable to such appeals are set out in the procedures determined by the Minister under Section 29B of the Education Act 1998 which are published on the website of the Department of Education and Skills.
